Kenya is a global leader in conservation, and eco-tourism plays an important role for the survival of wildlife in your country. We have always been a big supporter of this since Kenya has always been one of the leaders when it comes to sustainable tourism. One of the essentials in sustainable tourism is that local tour operators and guides should maintain a respectful distance of wildlife at all times.

Unfortunately these guidelines have been treated with contempt as shown in various recent footage which has gone viral on social media channels. We are grateful you recently spoke out against misconduct during the Maasai Mara Wildebeest Migration in a <u>press release</u>. We therefore hope that you will take a firm stand when it comes upon the suggested actions mentioned in this press release. Not only during this Migration or in the Masaai Mara, but by enforcing these actions at all times, in all National Parks and Reserves.

We think that actions such as disciplinary and legal consequences for drivers, guides or companies which disregard globally accepted rules for sustainable tourism, are now essential to safeguard wildlife in your country. It is as well of the utmost importance if Kenya wants to maintain the global leader in eco-tourism.
